What is a Census?

A Census is an official count of a country's population at a specified time. A census collects important information on education, health, employment, income, housing and other population characteristics.

A Census is a global initiative carried out by countries worldwide. The United Nations Statistical Division sets international guidelines, methodologies and standards for statistical agencies worldwide for undertaking a census.

The first known census in Bermuda was conducted in 1843. The most recent census was taken in the year 2000. The next census will be conducted in 2010. Census Day is May 20th 2010.

Why is a Census Needed?

Data and information must be collected on every single resident in Bermuda to provide a national snapshot of what Bermuda looks like in terms of its people and their housing. Information will be captured about one's age, race, education, occupation, income, religion, childcare, health and employment. This is the only way a full picture is obtained of what is really happening in Bermuda.

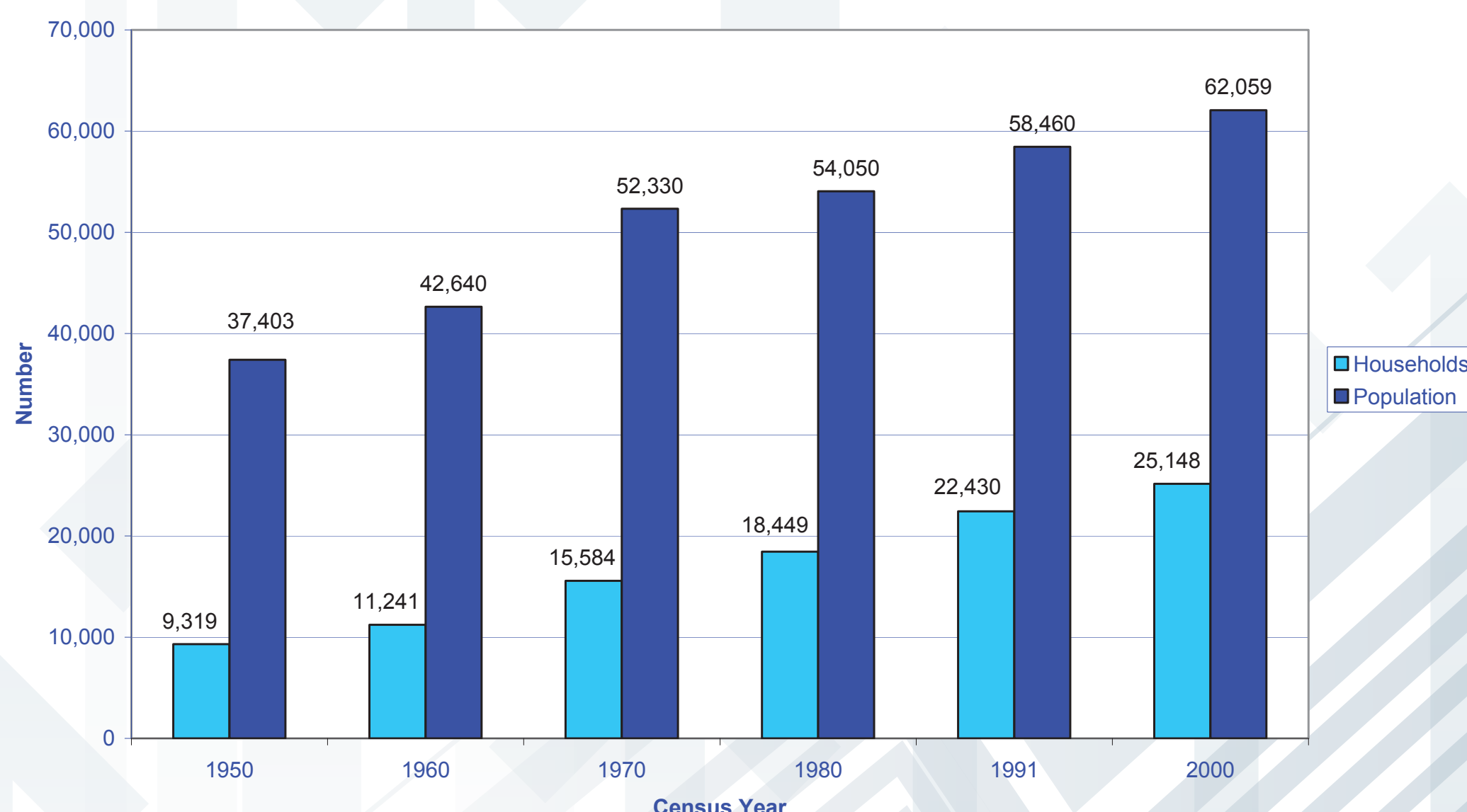
Public and Private organizations use census data to develop policies, programmes and recommendations to meet society's needs.

A Census is needed – "Because People Count!"

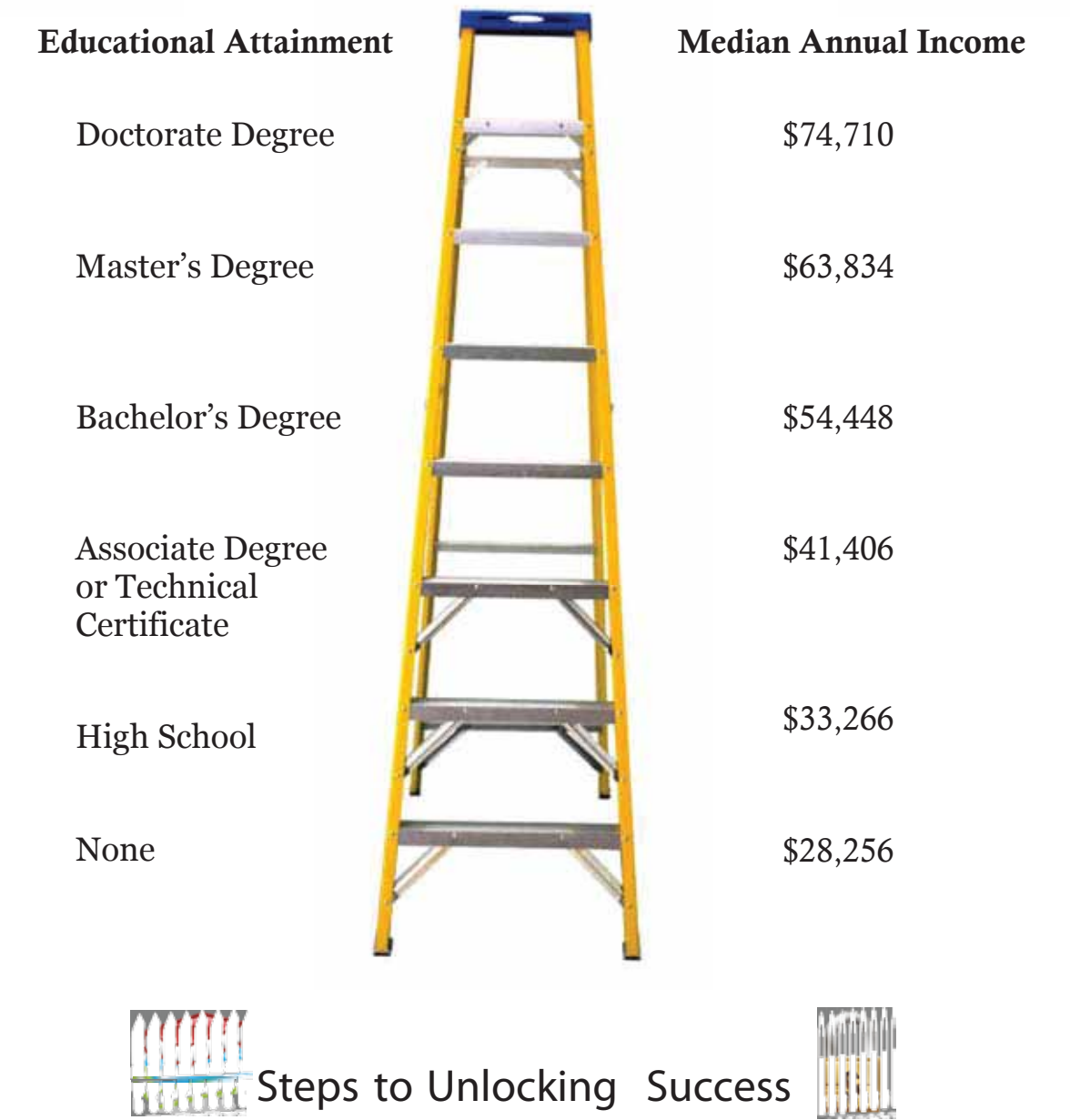
Look at How We've Grown
